Our goal is to close the literacy opportunity gap among children birth to age six in highneed communities by helping families develop and practice shared home reading habits.




WHY EARLY LITERACY?

Statewide Issue

43% of 3rd graders are not reading at grade level.

Income Matters

61% of 3rd graders in low-income families are not reading at grade level.



In MA, 1 out of 3 students in high-need communities will not graduate high school

because they started kindergarten behind and were unable to catch up.

Race Matters

59% of black 3rd graders are not reading at grade level.64% of Hispanic/Latino 3rd graders are not reading at grade level.

Language Matters

73% of English Language Learner students are not at grade level by end of 3rd grade.

WHY THIS EARLY?

RAR-MA harnesses the power of the early years when 2 key factors are in play:

Children's brain development is at its peak.

Parents are the most involved in children's daily lives.





90% of a child's brain has developed by age 5. Brain connections are fostered through interactions between adult and child, and shared reading is one of the best ways to nurture these back-and-forth interactions.


Parental involvement in children's literacy practices is a more powerful force than other background variables, such as income, family size, and level of parental education. (Flouri and Buchanan, 2004)

Raising readers of their own, Amanda, as Board Chair, and Christine, as Interim Executive Director, share a passion and commitment to early literacy skills and how critical they are in preparing a child for school as they serve as the foundation for learning in all subjects. We are so inspired by the stories that we hear from our program team, program partners, and our parents. This is what motivates us every day to continue the work we do and look for ways to increase our impact. Our texting and modeling videos, created with WGBH, have been a wonderful complement to our program model, reinforcing our message and training, and allowing for convenience and ease of use. At a recent site visit in Lawrence, a parent shared "I've learned the importance of reading. My child enjoys it, and I get to see how she connects what we are reading to her own life."

We are thrilled with the success of our Parent Ambassador program. It has taken a life of its own, serving as a leadership experience for our champions and a step into future work opportunities. Parents build skills and confidence and give back to their community. We are also excited about implementing a new program model with our RAR in the Workplace. This new delivery model allows us to work with corporations and our constituents by extending our program model in the workplace as an enhanced employee benefit. We are optimistic about how this new delivery model will grow as we launched in early summer.

Our evidence-based program remains strong as we serve 10 gateway cities (high-need communities) and Boston, plus our fee-for-service partners, and we are happy with the good results from our newest gateway city, Holyoke. Our new RAR in the Workplace model shows early promise as we continue to innovate and find new ways to reach our constituents and strengthen their home literacy environment while serving our communities.

We had a good year. We could not do this work alone. Thank you to our donors, program partners, and parent ambassadors who help make such a huge impact on the young children and families we support and the important work of eliminating the opportunity gap.

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



Somaya Ouard (pictured right, on the left) immigrated to the US from Morocco in search for a better life. She resides in Chelsea with her husband and two children, ages 5 and 2.

She first learned about RAR-MA when her daughter received a Red Book Bag from the Chelsea-Revere Family Network. Eager to learn more, Somaya attended a workshop at the Chelsea Public Library.

The message and trainings were so powerful that she kept attending and asked to increase her involvement in the organization, eventually taking on a leadership role as a Parent Ambassador. She was instrumental in accessing the Arabic speaking population and now regularly delivers workshops in Arabic.

Somaya feels that Raising A Reader MA has helped her in many ways: with access to books, strategies on how to read with her children and the importance of asking questions. Finally, it gave her the opportunity to get the training and become a Parent Ambassador, which she believes will open more doors.


OUR POPULATION
